Conifers

Eastern White Cedar – small to medium sized tree, fan like branches and scaly like leaves. Widely used for screens or hedges.

Douglas Fir - The color, symmetrical form and needle holding ability of this evergreen make it the most popular Xmas tree. Needles are blue-green and soft and the Douglas Fir is a vigorous grower in moist, well-drained, light soils.

Colorado Blue Spruce - Highly valued as a colorful windbreak, screen or Xmas tree, this spruce has stiff, silvery-blue to green 1" long needles. Will grow in ordinary soil with average moisture but does best in a well-drained, deep soil.

Norway Spruce - One of the faster growing spruces it has dense, dark green needles 1" long. Also one of the best varieties for poorly-drained, clay soils. Used for windbreaks and Xmas trees.

Canaan Fir - Dark to bluish dark green needles, the undersides of the needles have two white stripes very similar to the Fraser Fir with more limber branching. Naturally adapted to overly moist sites and late frosts.

Balsam Fir – Native to northeast, it has ½" to 1¼" long, soft needles that are very aromatic. Needs a cool, moist, well-drained soil and full sunlight.

White Pine - Fast growing species that will reach 100' tall. Does best in full sun and can grow in wet, swampy areas.

Deciduous Trees and Shrubs

Native Birch - 50' high, single or multi-stemmed slender tree. White bark appears after 3-4 years. Grows well in most soils and provides habitat for wildlife.

Red Osier Dogwood- 7-9' slender, upright shrub. Red stem, white drupe fruit mid-August. Best in wet or swampy conditions. Good structure for holding soil on sloped areas.

White Flowering Dogwood - Flowering dogwoods grow to a height of 35 to 40 feet It is a shrub or small, low-branched tree usually with a flat-topped crown, oval or ovate leaves, about 3 to 6 inches long and 1 to 3 inches wide. The white dogwood is very versatile—growing in acidic, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well-drained and clay soils. It prefers moist conditions.

Butterfly Bush – Multi-stemmed 12-16' shrub. Purple flowers August into fall . Prefer drier soils but can tolerate clay.

Black Cherry- 50-80' upright tree, prefer deep well drained soil do best on north and east facing slopes. White flowers in early spring.

White Oak – This is a shade tree, featuring a spreading canopy capable of blocking sunlight. The white oak grows to a height of 50–80' and a spread of 50–80' at maturity. Full sun and partial shade are best for this tree, meaning it prefers a minimum of four hours of direct, unfiltered sunlight each day. The white oak prefers slightly acidic to neutral, deep, moist, well-drained soil. While adaptable to other soil textures, it is intolerant of alkaline, shallow or abused urban soils.

Swamp White Oak – Grows to a height of 50–60' and full sun is the ideal condition for this tree. Grows in acidic, moist, well-drained and clay soils.

Black Walnut - Grows up to 100' medium growth rate. Great shade tree.

Eastern Redbud- Grows up to 30 feet. Leaves are heart shaped with rosy pink flowers that emerge in April. Adapts to a wide range of soils.

Tulip Tree – Grows up to 160' tall. Known for its large flowers that resemble tulips.

Berries

Blue Ray & Jersey Blueberry – Up to 6' tall and prefers slightly acidic, well drained soils. Blue Crop harvests in July and Jersey harvests in August.

Blackberry – Variety is darrow. Up to 6' tall and grows at a medium rate. Prefers well drained soils.

Raspberry – Variety is Latham. Up to 6' tall and is fast growing. Prefers well drained, slightly acidic soils.

Fruit Trees

Honeycrisp Apple- Harvest in mid-September. Apples are medium rounded shaped. They are red with orange/yellow stripes. One of the hardiest of the apple trees.

Bartlett Pear-Harvest in late August. Pears are large and yellow in color. Need well drained soils.

Redhaven Peach- This is a mid-season harvest variety. Peaches are large and yellow in color. Has clusters of fragrant pink flowers in the spring.

Stella Sweet Cherry- The Stella cherry is self-fruitful - no pollenizer needed. It has a large, nearly black, richly flavored sweet cherry. Similar to its parent, Lambert. Expect a later harvest with the Stella cherry. It will pollinate with the Bing cherry tree, except in mild winter climates. The flesh is also black in color.

It is an excellent cherry for fresh eating. It is also resistant to cracking. Tree bears at a young age. Tree eventually reaches 15 to 16 feet tall. Watch for birds, they love the Stella.
